To the Students of Randolph-Hacon:

As college students and responsible sitizens of America, you are obligated in certain ways to your country:

<u>First</u> -- To be alert and informed citizens, in an age when ignorance or mixinformation could bring political catastrophs -- an age when the guarding of our mearest communities may elitmately depend upon our knowledge of the most distant lands and peoples.

<u>Second</u> -- To be colerant and sensitive citizens -- so that our society may not suffer the soral sickness that is bigotry -- and may clearly perceive the values and the virtues cherished in other societies.

Third -- To be skilled and accomplished citizens -- able to grasp the great levers, turn the giant wheels, of this new atomic age, as wature finally surrenders to men so many of its colonnal secrets.

Fourth -- To be wise and reflective citizens, thankful for the new leisure, promising a new freedom from much toil -- not merely to relax in pleasure but to cultivate the mind and to nourish the spirit. To be wholly educated, in the sense that man is a spiritual and intellectual and physical being. America needs citizens strong in their ideals and spiritual convictions, healthy in their bodies, and tirelessly inquiring in mind.

And finally -- to be bold and courageous citizens, knowing that strength and sattifice are the indispensable saving weapons of freedom -- and knowing that the frontier in America, that rules so much of our history, has become, in this age, the frontier that is America -- leader of free nations, hope of free men.






The Student Government, which was modeled after the democratic form of government, occupies a powerful and responsible position on the campus of Randolph-Macon College, It was inaugurated in order to preserve a certain amount of freedom, which is desired by all students, and can attain this end only if each student lives by the Constitution upon which the Student Government is built. Just as a chain is only as strong as its weakest link, so is the Student Government only as strong as its weakest member. Thus, if each student will take the opportunity, accept his responsibility, the Student Government will achieve its purpose.

Our Student Government is composed of three main offices: the Executive Committee, consisting of a President, Vice-President, and Secretary-Treasurer; the Student Deans, formed by the four class presidents; and the Judicial Council, comprised of seven upperclassmen, appointed by the President of the Student Government.

These representative groups of students function to maintain the principles of the Honor Code and promote good relations among the administration, faculty, and student body.







Greetings to the student body of Handolph-Mapon College:

Of all the many activities, interests and institutions of campus life, none is more controve sial or more passionately debated than the social fraternity.

By own fraternity gave me warm and lasting friendships and many pleasant memories. Beyond that, it gave me an added sense of soral responsibility and of the obligation of human brotherhood.

The fraternity becomes a bad influence only when those who belong to it forget its underlying purpose — when the true sense of the word "fraternity" is ignored and the society becomes wiscriminatory, rather than properly discriminating. In the exclusiveness that is implicit in fraternity life lies danger of social casts systems based on superficial superjorities that may cruelly penalize those who for financial or other reasons are not fraternity amoneys.

It is a basic principle of the fraternal ideal that such unfortunate distinctions of casts and snobbery are not to be tolerated or accepted as the natural order of things.

In the long run, the fraternity will thrive only so far as it contributes some lasting value to our campus and later life. I suggest that a primary role of the fraternity should be to encourage us all, as individuals and as a nation, to accept and act upon the idea of fraternity in its best and broadest sense. Our experience with fraternity at the college level ineally should be a training in the practical day-to-day workings of brotherhood.

If it is that, then by all means it should and will also be an experience of good fellowship, good times, and harpy neutries.







As usual the Sig-Eps were very active in the social life of the campus, and excelled in intramural and varsity sports.





# Cheerleaders








Above: David B. Young, Captain. Below: Coaches McCutcheon, Stephens and Severin.

fortunate in having him as its mentor. Ted Keller moved into the position Mc-Cutcheon vacated,

The season was much better than the final record of 3 wins, 3 losses, and 2 ties might appear, as the Jackets were in the running for the Mason Dixon Conference and Little Eight Championships up until the last two games when they bowed to Hampden-Sydney and Emory and Henry.

Entering the game with Hampden-Sydney as a seven point underdog, the Yellow lackets out-played the undefeated Tigers for three periods before a fourth quarter rally enabled Bob Thalman's team to take a 26-19 victory. The outstanding play of Captain Young, Bill Cox, Bunkie Keeton, Sig Howerton, and especially the defensive play of John Llewellyn, enabled Randolph-Macon to take a 13-7 half-time lead. However a poor punt at the beginning of the second half and the passing of Hampden-Sydney's quarterback Bobby Furraided the Tigers in finishing strong in the final period for the victory.


In the final game of the season, against the Wasps of Emory and Henry, the Jackets did not have the necessary drive as the Wasps rolled to an easy victory.

In other games, the Jackets opened their season by being crushed 40-0 by a much stronger University of Richmond team. This was the last game, however, in a series dating back over fifty years. Randolph-

Macon Athletic Director Hugh Stephens announced that the series would be terminated in 1958 due to differences in athletic policies of the two schools. Following a tie at Western Maryland, paced by the tremendous running of fullback Bob Rayner and the passing of Sig Howerton, the Jackets rolled to successive wins over Apprentice School, Bridgewater, and Washington and Lee. In the four contests, Rayner averaged well over 80 yards rushing per game. Against Johns Hopkins, both teams were hampered by mud and unsure footing, as the Severinmen battled to a 0-0 deadlock, sending them into the Hampden-Sydney game with a 3-1-2 record.

Besides Young, whose honors speak well enough for his performances, the play of Rayner and Howerton was impressive. The Junior fullback and quarterback were chosen as cocaptains for the 1958 season. In the line McCutcheon has a real job in filling posts vacated by Seniors Cox, Llewellyn, Keeton, Gravely, Joyner, and Young. Switching from center to tackle, Cox came along at the end of the season becoming one of the best linemen in the area, and being named to the All-Little Eight Team. Likewise, the play of Llewellyn and Keeton, playing their first seasons at center and end respec-


tively, and Jim Gravely was outstanding all season.

Sophomores Garnette and Cole with freshman Ward showed excellent potential for the future Randolph-Macon gridiron. 


# Basketball

The first trip to a Mason-Dixon Conference cage tournament in five years, the first winning season in eleven years, and the best season percentagewise in twenty years—this is the contribution of the 1957-58 Randolph-Macon College basketball team and head coach Paul Webb.

Compiling a regular season mark of 13 wins in 21 games, and 9 in 13 loop encounters, the '57-'8 Jackets placed four starters—freshman Billy Robinson (15.1), senior co-captain Ken Joyner (14.2), freshman Carl Koenig (13.6) and soph Jerry Suyes (10.7) in double figures. The team's fifth regular, soph Frank Wawner tallied 174 points and snatched 306 rebounds in 22 games.

Randolph-Macon hit better than 39 per cent of its field goal attempts during the past season. When the squad's balance and spirit were combined with a snappy shooting performance from the floor, the results were often quite pleasant to Jacket fans. Such a thrill was Feburary 14's 69-50 win over Roanoke College, a jinx of long-standing.

Against the Maroons, the Ashlanders canned 48.3 per cent of their shots, and placed four men, Billy Robinson (20), Ken Joyner (15), Carl Koenig (15), and Jerry Suyes (11) in double

point totals. Frank Wawner tallied 8 points, and collected 24 rebounds.

Though R-MC bowed to American University, 75-55, in the first round of M-D tourney play, the fighting Jackets showed enough promise to indicate that this season's successes would be followed by more of the same in the very near future.

The fine team balance is reflected in post-season honor team selections: Joyner, first team Associated Press All Little Eight: and treshmen sparkplugs Koenig and Robinson, second team All Little Eight. In addition, Joyner, second highest scorer in R-MC hardwood history, was runner-up for the second consecutive season in the "Most Valuable Player in the Little Eight" race. Wawner, for his talented work in the backboards, was chosen captain-elect of the 1958-59 Jacket quint.



# Baseball

It's a lucky thing baseball doesn't come but once a year, because if it came any more often, Randolph-Macon College coach Hugh Stephens would be a nervous wreck. Year in, year out, the Jacket pilot weeps and moans about prospects for a dark, gloomy season to come, and each year his team runs up an imposing won-lost record. In its "hopeless" pre-season forecast, the 1958 R-MC diamond season was no different.

Not that the Jacket skipper was quite ready to throw in the crying towel, stitches and all. Stephens had ten lettermen back from last season's Southern Division runners-up to help ease his sorrows. Casualties, though few, however, were costly. Gone were ace pitchers Lew Brandt (5-3; 1.13 ERA), Dave Boyd (3-2; 1.63 ERA), and third baseman Phil Coppage, (.291).

Junior catcher and team captain Don Colley (.316) and a trio of heavy-hitting outfields, Bunkie Keeton (.415), Marshall Hughes (.377), and Bill Cox (.313) would provide the brighter side of any coach's work. Together with Colley, soph Norman Jenkins and freshman Don Post made the backstopping outlook unusually solid.

The remainder of the infield, however, was not so set. Junior Bill Smith (.353) and freshman Chick Crawford offered a formidable duo at second. Utility infielder John Hogge (.182) appeared to have the jump over senior Hunter Bowles and rookie John Bagby at the hot spot. Shortstop was manned by freshman Bob Goulder, a converted third baseman, and soph Billy Garnett.

The pitching staff appeared shallow, too, unless new men Jimmy Smith, a senior, and Mac Felts, a freshman, came through. Both showed up well in early-season scrimmages. They joined monogram-winners Walt Barr (3-1; 2.87 ERA) and Cig Howerton (1-0; 3.76 ERA) to comprise the bulk of the Jacket mound staff. Junior Bob Royster and freshman Ron Simonsen figured to lend spot aid to this quartet.

Things have looked dark before for the Hugh Stephens-coached nines. But with 120 wins in 160 games—three Mason-Dixon and six Little Eight titles—since 1950, everything seems to indicate that the "darkness" won't last too long.
