

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

### Black Heritage Month

The 1992 edition of Black Heritage Month on campus began with the viewing of a few culturally-conscious movies; "Lean on Me," served as an introduction to one of the most famous individuals in the history of education- Joe Clark. As a principal in one of the most troubled public institutions in New Jersey, Joe Clark demonstrated the effective manner in which he defeated violence and drugs. During his lecture on campus, Clark stressed the importance of education and discipline and how they help a person to achieve his/her goals. Also, during his speech, Clark emphasized the principle of always doing right by yourself and others regardless of how unappreciative people are. In his eyes, everyone should take control of his/her destiny, and not wait for something to happen.

When he turned to the subject of ethnic problems, Clark delivered his thoughts and feelings without hesitation: "There is a chance out there for everyone but it is each and everyone's own responsibility to find it and use it. America is a great country, the best country in the world despite its flaws

and inequities. All of us have to work together to work these problems out. If you can't make it in America, you can't make it anywhere. But we must stop judging people by the color of their skin, the size of their lips or nose, the structure of their hair."

Other guests who made their appearances on campus were poet Jeanette Drake and musician Ayaba Awoyemi. During her speech on the development of African-American poetry, Drake cited examples of various works, including her own, on slavery, welfare, civil rights, and equality. During her musical review, Awoyemi gave her audience a taste of many different types of typically African-American forms of music, including jazz, gospel, and reggae.

The final events of the month included a play entitled "1001 Black Inventions," which cited many inventions created by black scientists throughout history, and a food sampling entitled "Food and Facts," which offered a variety of ethnic dishes from different black cultures around the world.

During Black Heritage Month, musician Ayaba Awoyemi gave a review of various cultural music.








## Washington Literary Society







Many teams such as the field hockey and women's soccer grabbed the ODAC (Old Dominion Athletic Conference) title for their division. Other teams did just as well. If it had not been for the upset against Hampden-Sydney, the football team would have also claimed the ODAC championship title. Other exciting notes of interest lay in the fact that the sport of cross country was reinstated and the

team performed well for their first year. Also, the fact that the field hockey team won the ODAC says so much about the coach, but even more about the team that achieved that title. The winter and spring sports also had much to be proud of since the returning players and newcomers gave their all. Whether it was on the court, the field, or the course, each member of every varsity squad met every challenge with spirit and enthusiasm.



## Full Of Promise

The Yellow Jacket football team finished the season with a 4-6-0 record and a 3-2-0 ODAC record. The Yellow Jackets defeated Juniata (20-12), as well as ODAC opponents Washington and Lee (27-0), Bridgewater (34-7), and Guildford (20-17). The Yellow Jackets' losses in the ODAC were against Emory & Henry (21-10) and rival Hampden-Sydney (29-28).

The Yellow Jackets averaged 350 yards in the offense per game while giving up 257 yards. In most games the Yellow Jackets obtained more first downs and more yards than their opponents.

Eight records were broken. Scott Kirby broke six records including "Most Career Yards Passing" with 4,054 yards, "Most Yards Total Offense" in a single game with 368 yards against Guilford, and "Most Career Offensive Yards Total" with 4,541. Other records include "Most Career Pass Receptions" by Steve Dodd with 112 catches and "Most Field Goals" in a single game by Micheal Duffy with nine field goals. Despite the overall team record, the Yellow Jackets accomplished many individual achievements which reflects the dedication of each player to his team.



Defensively, goalie Karley Watt played well all year and broke the women's soccer record for shutouts. Amy Towler, Dana Goff, Denise Benitez, and Emily Straight always helped the Yellow Jackets with a strong defense.

Though the Lady Jackets

played well during the regular season, they showed their true playing abilities during post-season play. The Yellow Jackets won the first round game against Hollins at home by a score of 2-0. Traveling to Lynchburg, the team beat Lynchburg 2-1 in the semi-finals and Roanoke College 3-2 in the finals. Heather Durrenberger had two goals in post-season play and Jennifer Zuckerman scored three goals to lead the team. Jennifer Jumba and Emily Straight also added a goal each.



This season was highlighted with a second place finish in the Old Dominion Athletic Conference final standings. The Jackets made a strong run for first place by giving unbeaten Virginia Wesleyan a scare. Unfortunately, after a 1-0 halftime lead by the Jackets, they fell to the Blue Marlins of Virginia Wesleyan. Victories over VMI, Washington & Lee, and Roanoke during the regular season were other highlights.

In the ODAC Tournament, the Jackets fell against Roanoke in the semi-finals. After

regulation time, the game was tied 1-1. During overtime, Roanoke defeated the Yellow Jackets on penalty kicks and advanced to the championship game.

The team was led in scoring by Matt Bitsko and Hunter Tyree. Bitsko had 8 goals and 2 assists while Tyree finished the season with 7 goals and 5 assists. Hunter Tyree presently ranks eighth on the school's all-time scoring list with 24 goals and 14 assists (62 points) during his career. His record is the highest since Rob Trafton, whose all-time score was 116 points between 1981 and 1984.






key players were Gayle Belluce and Jennifer Keffler who both finished with 4-6 for their season in single competition.

## A Modest Season


The 1992 season for the golf team ended with a modest finish. Although the team as a whole did not perform highly in most of their competitions, there were many achievements on the individual level.


averaged 84.4 with a low of 76.

# A Cultural Experience

While internship programs guarantee a working experience, my internship also gave me a living experience. As an Arts Management major, I had to participate in an internship at an art establishment. So, I wrote to the Tate Gallery in London and informed them of my interest in working there in January. After Jennifer Booth, the director of the Archive Department of the Tate, notified me that she would be glad to provide an internship for me, I jumped at the opportunity to work abroad.

My living experience began December 19th when I arrived in London, Bloomsbury, in the heart of London, is what I called home for the next seven weeks. I rented a flat and started meeting the people who lived in the area around me. The people were reserved at first, but they became more open and inviting with each encounter.

My working experience was truly incredible. The archive is a depository of all types of materials including such things as letters, sketch books, palates, and artists' painting smocks. I focused on a collection of letters donated to the gallery by the Norton Estate. Lady Norton was a patron of the arts who developed and maintained friendships with modern artists between the years of 1950-1970. Many artists depended upon Lady Norton's financial and promotional support for the development of their careers. I organized the letters in alphabetical and chronological order within each file. After organizing the material, the collection was added to the archive where researchers and professors have access to this information.

The experience I gained from working abroad changed my life. I was fortunate to have the opportunity to extend my knowledge of art, and at the same time, learn about myself and other people in the world.




