June 2, 1775 was the birthday of John Randolph, one of the two men for whom our college was named. Two-hundred-two years later, June 2, 1985, saw the 153 rd Commencement exercises at R-MC with guests Governor Charles Robb and columnist Charles McDowell.

In a class of 182, there were three magna cum laude graduates (Mary Armstrong. Jo Anne Brooks, and Robin Anne Floyd), and ten with cum laude honors. Robin Anne Floyd, in her Senior Address, spoke of goals and potentials, and of what the Class of 1985 can achieve in the next twenty years.
The Honorable Charles S. Robb, Governor of Virginia, greeted the class and bestowed his good wishes to them. The main speaker Charles McDowell addressed "Politics in the Real World." He spoke of the nation's trust and distrust of politicians, the desire for a simple life, and his career in political journalism.
